Dear Wordsmiths and Friends,

In today's Age (31/7) I came across an excellent article by Louise Adler, which I quote from here: In A History of Reading, Alberto Manguel arrives at the same conclusion with a personal story about the importance of literature even in the darkest of places: "When I was 10 or 11, one of my teachers in Buenos Aires tutored me in the evenings in German and European history. To improve my German pronunciation, he encouraged me to memorise poems by Heine, Goethe and Schiller, and a Gustav Schwab ballad, in which a rider gallops across the frozen Lake of Constance and, on realising what he has accomplished, dies of fright on the far shore. I enjoyed learning the poems but I didn't understand of what use they might possibly be.

"'They'll keep you company on the day you have no books to read,' my teacher said. Then he told me that his father, murdered in Sachsenhausen, had been a famous scholar who knew many of the classics by heart and who, during his time in the concentration camp, had offered himself as a library to be read to his fellow inmates. I imagined the old man in that murky, relentless, hopeless place, approached with a request for Virgil or Euripides, opening himself up to a given page and reciting the ancient words for his bookless readers. Years later, I realised that he had been immortalised as one of the crowd of roaming book savers in Bradbury's Fahrenheit 451.

A text read and remembered becomes, in that redemptive rereading, like the frozen lake in the poem I memorised so long ago — as solid as land and capable of supporting the reader's crossing, and yet, at the same time, its only existence is in the mind, as precarious and fleeting as if its letters were written on water."

The last paragraph especially, moved me.

Since we last wrote, much has happened. Our Wordsmiths meetings are growing in size. At our July meeting we had 21, a record attendance. With so many it was necessary to split the group for our workshopping time-some upstairs and some downstairs. A special welcome to first-timers Ros, Paige


POETRY WEEKEND

We would also like to find out how many of you would be interested in coming to a Poetry Weekend, in place of our usual meeting in November. (November 9-11th) We ran it last year for the first time, with a Quiet Day on the Saturday (a day of silent retreat, directed by a spiritual director, using poetry, prayer, meditation and writing) followed by a Sunday time of fellowship together and a Poetry Workshop (to be led by Kathryn Hamann) in the afternoon. Please advise us, via the Response slip, if you're interested in coming, so that we'll know whether or not to organise it. Last year, with seven of us staying the whole weekend, we were able to stay in a holiday house at Shoreham, but if the numbers go up, we could find an alternative venue. By selfcatering we can keep the cost down – it could be between \$50-\$100, depending on the venue and numbers going.

WORKSHOP WITH RON PRETTY

We had 14 in for a workshop with Ron Pretty on Saturday 28th of July, an extra meeting as Ron was unable to come for his preciously scheduled visit. Ron started by telling us about the Australian Poetry Centre, an exciting new development for Poetry in Australia. This is the fruit of Ron's many years work in setting up the Poetry Foundation and the Five Islands Press which has over 300 titles to its credit. Located at Glenfern in East St Kilda, the Centre will be busy encouraging poets.Ron went on to lead us in a fascinating workshop starting with a poem from which he had removed the last line. We had to try to think of how it should be worded. We were all surprised by the original. He then went on to get us to write a corporate poem, which proved to produce much entertainment. A very stimulating afternoon, as Ron also showed us by the way, just what we were doing as we wrote.

LAUNCH OF "EARTH WORKS"



June 23rd was the event of the year: the launch of our 21st book, with **Janette Fernando**, our new managing

editor, in charge of proceedings. Held at one of our favourite haunts, St Paul's Lutheran Church in Box Hill, it attracted an audience of 70 people.

Janette carried the evening off very well. It was satisfying for her to be able to present a book representing so many poets and to have so many of them there able to read their work. John West, who launched the book, set our work in the context of earlier Christian poets such as William Blake and Dean Jonathan Swift and applauded our efforts. We were all delighted that he chose among the poems he read in launching the book, one by Ashley Harris (who was firmly refusing to read his own work) and one of Janette's. Afterwards many people commented about how lovely it was to hear the poets reading their own work. We were enthralled by the musical interludes presented between readings, by one of our poets Cathy Altmann, playing violin, accompanied by pianist Angela Chandler. There were also many appreciative comments about the cover of the book. Janette called on **Jean Sietzema-Dickson**, the Director of Poetica Christi Press, to speak about the exciting new projects ahead: 1. a coffee table book (providing we can attract funding) to be called Reflections on Melbourne featuring art work as well as poetry about Melbourne. 2. The start of publishing poetry for children with the forthcoming production of Stick your Neck out by Leigh Hay and a revamped bigger version of *The Huggle* by Jean Sietzema-Dickson.

As usual the occasion turned into a very good party and there was great enjoyment in meeting poets and their families.

In August, I have invited Rebecca Maxwell to be our featured reader, then in September we hope to have Alex Skovron, October Robyn Smith and in November I have John West coming- that will probably be the last meeting for the year. The cost for each gathering is \$5.
