WORDSMITHS NEWSLETTER - 7.4 - OCTOBER, 2007

Dear Wordsmiths and Friends.

At a recent breakfast at the Tudor, held to raise money to support the Chaplain to the business community of Box Hill, the speaker was Larry Nemer, SVD (Divine Word Missionaries) whose topic was PROPHETIC DIALOGUE: A New Way of Communicating. Since we say in our brochure that poets raise a prophetic voice in the community I thought it worth sharing a few of his ideas.

He gave five definitions of the word Prophet:

- 1. One who listens to the Word of God as it comes to us from outside the christian sources and christian communities
- 2. One who announces the word of God to the community
- 3. One who indentifies and denounces sinfulness, idolatry, and injustices
- 4. One who proclaims hope in God's faithfulness
- 5. One who is in dialogue with others by this action communicates God-in-Communion and promises the Kingdom of God.

I believe that our poetry is indeed prophetic in these ways, even in the last point, in that we are communicating with our readers and with each other. But I found it helpful to look at our work through this lens.

VALE VERA URBAN

It was with sorrow that we read of the death of Vera Urban, a much-loved member of the Wordsmiths, and the first individual poet to be published by Poetica Christi Press. I was deeply honoured by Vera's request to be the publisher of Scenario, a beautiful collection of finely crafted poetry of which we still have a few copies, thanks to the generosity of her executors who made a gift of 6 copies to Poetica Christi Press. Cath Barnard Janette Fernando & I were able to represent the Wordsmiths at her funeral service at the Uniting Church in Paring Rd Balwyn where she had worshipped for many years. The service was a joyful celebration of the life of a generous teacher and friend who enriched the lives of all she knew. It was a delight to hear a number of her poems read by the minister and by fellow poets, including Dianne Fahey.

20th BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION

On a more cheerful note it was a real joy to be able to celebrate our 20 years of meeting as a group at Glenfern (home of the Australian Poetry Centre) on September 7th. The Home of the Boyd family, Glenfern is now under the care of the National Trust. It

is a beautiful old building and the drawing room made a wonderful venue for our event. Frederika Bastecky played the viola to welcome us, setting the scene for an evening of poetry, good food and fellowship among the 50-60 people who attended.

Judith Rodriguez, our special guest for the evening, managed to arrive in spite of having spent the afternoon at the hospital with her daughter. She regaled us with a wonderful variety of poetry, some of which was translation of other's poetry, which to me is one of the highest forms of art. Eighteen Wordsmiths were there to celebrate the evening, share their work and to enjoy our birthday cake inscribed at Janette's direction with the words "20 years of words worth writing!" Six Wordsmiths who have been members for 17 years or more, who used to meet together when the venue was Oakleigh, were made Life Members and were invited to blow out the candles on the cake. All in all, a great evening to remember.

I was particularly delighted to notice how enthralled my 11 year old grand daughter was by *The Wind hover* by Gerard Manly Hopkins. I made sure I took it up next time I went to visit and read it to her again.
