PAST MEETINGS

At the August Wordsmiths, **Carolyn Vimpani** spoke on the Scottish poet Robbie Burns, and read snippets from his poems – not an easy thing to do if you're not a native Scot. **Leigh Hay** led in September with poetry from the WW1 poets Wildfred Owen and Siegfried Sassoon, and at the October meeting, **Greg Burns** talked more about the poets of WW1 and read 'Marching Song' by Rev GA Studdert-Kennedy (Woodbine Willie) and also 'Little Giffen', a poignant poem from the American War of Independence by Francis Orray Ticknor.

SparkLit Australian Christian Publishers' Forum



On Friday 15 August, over 30 people (including five members of Wordsmiths) attended an inaugural publishing forum organised by Michael Collie, the National Director of *SparkLit.org : Igniting Christian Writing* (formerly the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge Australia and the Australian Christian Literature Society). Facilitated discussions and chosen speakers focussed on writing and publishing for both Christian and secular readerships. Speakers included experts in public engagement, demographics, bookselling and public relations, and topics ranged from engaging an audience to selling more books. The forum followed the SparkLit Book of the Year Awards held the previous evening, where Cameron Semmens' *Love is the New Black (3rd Ed)* had been shortlisted. Cameron was also invited to open and close the SparkLit forum with performances of his poetry.

REPORT ON BOX HILL LIBRARY READINGS.

The September reading featured **Maree Silver**, on the theme of poetry of the Australian landscape. Maree lived in



the small West Wimmera town of Dimboola bordered by the Little Desert and the Wimmera River until, as a teenager, she moved to Melbourne to complete her studies.

A china painter, bush walker and amateur photographer, Maree's poetry responds to visual imagery and many of the poems read at the library, reflected this.

Other readers included Jean Sietzema-Dickson, Leigh Hay and Joan Ray.





November On 30th an anthology, Memory Byways, is to be launched at the Bacchus Marsh library. This unique collection of poems is the result of the patience and skill of two Poetry Facilitators, including Carolyn Vimpani, who have created pathways to



communication for people with dementia by providing interesting prompts and recording the conversations as poems. Photos were contributed by members of the Bacchus Marsh photography group. The project was funded under a Moorabool Shire Community Grant.

During November David Dwyer will be travelling to Nepal in support of Save the Children, during which time he will be volunteering in a remote Nepali community helping with school construction. As part of the trip, he will be fundraising for the project to help give village children the opportunity to go to school and also upgrade facilities at the Udaya Lower Secondary School. The project also aims at encouraging children to enrol in school, improve children's retention rate, adopt child centred teaching and learning, train teachers, and educate the community about children's rights issues.
