What a thrill it was to hear from our judge that the winner of our 2008 PCP poetry competition on the subject of *New Beginnings* was our own Kathryn Hamann, for her poem *Her*. Congratulations from us all Kathryn!

Equal second prize went to Jenny Macaffer and Peter Stiles, both of whom have been in our previous publications. The other good thing was the comment from our judge, Aileen Kelly, who said that the standard of work has gone up since the last time she judged our competition.

Other wordsmiths, chosen by her to have poems included in the book, are Sondy Ward, Leigh Hay, Marlene Marburg, Carolyn Ingvarson, Joan Ray and Cathy Altmann.

I do hope you have all enjoyed this holiday time and found it a real time of refreshing, a recreation of your best self.

By the end of the year Janette and I were both exhausted by the work we had been doing for the *Melbourne Reflections* book so we are both feeling better for some time out to get our lives in perspective again.

I have been enjoying spending time in weeding the back garden, which was a real mess. Just getting down on one's hands and knees and being close to the soil is a freeing thing, even while it can be another form of hard work. I am often reminded of Kipling's line of poetry where he talks about

"God who sees that half a proper gardener's work is done upon his knees",

as I find prayer comes easily while my hands are busy.

Another person who has been encouraging me to get back to realising my relatedness to the earth is Diarmuid O'Murchu, whom Piet and I heard speak at Wellspring recently and whose books we have been reading since. He suggests strongly that our patriarchal power structures are due for review and that we need to be developing a gentler way of looking after God's creation and a more relational way of living. Not that he is the only person saying this, but he does make a compelling case for it.

The other person who is helping me to view creation with new eyes is that wonderful American poet, Mary Oliver. She has a way of finding something to wonder at in such a variety of creatures.
