Welcome to the May edition of Wordsmiths Newsletter for 2018.

Over the last 18 months, I've been presenting talks to groups of seniors. I rather enjoy this activity, as it gives me a chance to meet and share ideas with older people on ways to preserve their life memories.

As a writer and poet, recording my family's highs, lows and seasons comes naturally. But this is not the case for everyone, hence the talks.

Many older people (particularly women) often say to me that they don't consider their lives have been all that exciting. What is there to document? They've married, raised a family, belonged to a few organisations and now perhaps care for grandchildren or a partner. They tell me that putting words together is not, nor has it ever been 'their thing'. They certainly don't believe their lives are worth writing about.

So this is where the fun starts. I usually begin a talk by assuring everyone in the room that their life is indeed very important. The older generation is tasked with passing on 'the knowledge', for when a person dies, what they do know dies with them.

Next, I gently throw up a challenge or two. How about writing down unique family sayings and turning these into bookmarks? What about laminating your grandchildren's drawings to use as placemats? Try putting together a family cookbook, or lists of favourite music, traditions, or albums of family photos complete with quirky captions? Try sharing your childhood stories with your grandchildren and encourage them to write their own. Craft is also a beautiful and creative way to pass on your original work to the next generation. At one talk, a lady told me that a friend of hers had collected teaspoons and when she died, everyone at her funeral was invited to take one in memory of her. By this stage, everyone is contributing and we've all had a good laugh.

But the highlight of the talks is when I read from PCP's anthologies. Poetry is so accessible and I find it's an easy thing to encourage older ones to forget their inhibitions, find time to put pen to paper and just let ideas flow. Poetry crosses the generation gap. "Your poetry", I tell them, "is like you.....it's irreplaceable."

PAST MEETINGS

Jean Sietzema-Dickson led the February meeting with readings of poetry by Rudyard Kipling and also John O'Donohue (Irish poet, author, priest and Hegelian philosopher). Kipling's poems included The Answer, Harp Song of the Dane Women (from Puck of Pook's Hill) and Cold Iron (which was read by Peter White). O'Donohue's poetry included Elemental and The Pleading.

Greg Burns led the March meeting with an interesting selection of poets and their works. Greg's selection included Introduction to Poetry - Billy Collins, Poet Laureate; S T Coleridge – Metrical Feet; Alfred Lord Tennyson – Break, break, break; and Rudyard Kipling – excerpts from McAndrews Hymn.

Janette Fernando led the April meeting, reading a collection of Easter poems from a workshop she had facilitated at Wellspring in March. Featured poets were Gerard Manley Hopkins (Easter), Luci Shaw (Trauma Center), Sandra Duguid (If Christ had Lept), Kathryn Hamann (Joy Comes in the Morning) and Cynthia Walkwitz (Re-enactment).

Welcomed at the April meeting were Daryl Pobke and Cate Lewis.
