2022 denotes a commemorative year for two of Australia's well-known poets. commemorates the 150th anniversary of John Shaw Neilson's birth in 1872 at Penola in South Australia. This year also commemorates a century since the death of Henry Lawson in Sydney in 1922. Both Neilson and Lawson were largely untrained and only basically educated. Slightly built, Neilson worked as a labourer for most of his life. Lawson was born on the goldfields at Grenfell, NSW and at 9 years of age began to lose his hearing as a result of illness. He attended Eurunderee PS but as family finances were meagre, he too laboured and worked for his father Niels Larsen, a Norwegian immigrant.

On the face of it, neither of these men could have been predicted to become poets of renown. And yet Neilson became known as one of Australia's finest lyric poets, writing much about the natural world and the beauty in it. His work is sensitive and poignant. Lawson, on the other hand, wrote of the bush, life's hardships and social discrimination. Lawson was a realist and in favour of a republic. Despite deafness, depression and alcoholism, Lawson wrote prolifically until his death. Both he and Neilson were largely selftaught in the techniques of poetry. Neilson is described as having a face that suggested kindliness, refinement and innate beauty of character. Lawson will always be remembered as 'the people's poet'.

Despite lack of education, material comfort and adequate finance, Neilson and Lawson felt compelled to write. Both men spent much of their lives in tents or cheap boarding houses and yet their contribution to Australian poetry Is hugely significant, with selections of their work set to music or performed for theatre. A bronze sculpture of Neilson resides in the Footscray Library. A bronze sculpture of Lawson resides in Footscray Park. Despite humble beginnings, two giants of Australian literature will be celebrated this year.

MEETINGS

Jean Sietzema-Dickson led the May meeting, attended in person by 8 poets (with 4 attending on Zoom). Jean featured Mary MacDonald, a past member of Wordsmiths. Born in India of missionary parents, Mary spent her holidays going to the hills area in Northern India for the cooler climate. She trained as a Maths/Science teacher and taught in Bendigo for some time. Mary was particularly strong in her faith, and had been a member of the Wattle Valley Christian poetry group before she joined Wordsmiths. Jean read In Everything Give Thanks, The Word Made Flesh, City, Husband, Saturday, and a short poem that Mary had written for one of PCP's bookmarks. Mary is remembered by those Wordsmiths who knew her for her quirky sense of humour, which came through in her delightful poetry.

Greg Burns led the June meeting, attended by 11 Wordsmiths on Zoom. Greg introduced the group to the poetry of John S McCullough, born in 1978 and now a lecturer at the University of Brighton UK. His poetry, often published on Twitter, is quirky and includes queer sub-culture poetry, and Greg read four poems from McCullough's latest book *Panic Response*: *Quantum, Error Garden, Glass Men* and *Jay*.

Leigh Hay led the July meeting, attended by 8 Wordsmiths. As Zoom could not be provided, there were also 7 apologies. Leigh talked about the poetry of Jordie Albiston, a Melbourne-based poet who died in February of this year. Jordie's work was widely published and anthologised and translated into several languages. In her life she received some major prizes and awards including the Mary Gilmore Award (for her book *Nervous Arcs*) and the NSW Premier's Literary Award. Her work includes 13 poetry collections, three books of children's poetry and a substantial handbook on poetic form. Leigh read *Playing Snap with God, Poet's Ark*, and *School Report (1928)*.

She and Coby went to TAFE to study writing together and had many poems published, including some on the cards, bookmarks and books produced by Poetica Christi Press.
