Welcome to the August '23 edition of Wordsmiths Newsletter.

A few weeks ago, I was approached by a member of our choir as she was interested in purchasing some poetry books. We got talking and she revealed that she had only recently been introduced to poetry and had discovered how satisfying it is to pen thoughts and ideas. She also revealed that she had never shown her poetry to anyone.

We met for a coffee, talked poetry (as you do!) and I told her about Poetica Christi Press and their annual competition and anthology. We talked of the myriad ways poetry can be expressed and communicated ... poems about travel (accompanied by photos), books for children, poetry in response to paintings, sketches, sculptures and other art forms (ekphrasis), anthologies and verse novels ... just to name a few.

She was enthused, I was enthused, and a few days later she emailed me two of her poems. I was astounded at how well they were crafted. With any poet, at any stage of their writing, there is always scope for learning and experimentation. Mentors, poetry groups, workshops, and reading the works of others are all excellent ways of developing a mature poetic voice and experimenting with style.

I'm hoping my new found poetry friend will join a group as she clearly has a heart for poetry and even as an emerging poet, is expressing her thoughts and ideas with clarity. We decided subsequent conversations over coffee were sorely needed. I may be more of an established poet than she, but I'm sure there's a lot I can learn from her, and her from me. After all, communicating through poetry is invariably a two-way deal.

Leigh Hay led the May meeting with the poetry of Melbourne poet Janet Howie. Janet writes articles and poetry and has a particular interest in haiku. She is also interested in botanical art and her work has won a number of awards and been published in literary magazines. Her books include Rotation (2004), Footprint (2013) and rePresenting nature (2018). Leigh read three poems from Rotation – Haircut, First Things and She.

Maree Silver introduced the June Hybrid Zoom meeting of the Wordsmiths and friends by reading poems written by Wordsmiths, taken from Celebrating the gift of poetry – a Collection from the WellSpring Poetry Network and produced by the WellSpring Centre. The meeting was attended by 12 poets in person and also by 2 on zoom, one of whom was 'zooming' in from Tennant Creek. Carolyn Vimpani and Greg Burns worked together to produce a coherent sharing of the group's poetry enabling us able to see each other and our poems via the shared screen.

Peter White led the July meeting, which 8 poets attended. Given it was NAIDOC week Peter chose poetry by Uncle Wes Marne from his book *Through Old Eyes*. Marne is an indigenous man who lived in the bush until he was 9 years old then was taken to a mission. He became a boxer and served in the Korean war. He is from a long line of storytellers and supports Aboriginal self-determination. Peter read *Campfire Dreaming; Return; Indigenous ones; The Let Down; Invasion Day* and *Dream On*.
