# MEETINGS

**Cecily Falkingham** led the August meeting, at which 10 poets attended. DH (David Herbert) Lawence was her chosen poet, and she explained that the first of Lawrence's works were poems. Born in 1885, he was a young school master in the early 1900s and kept a log book of his life and experiences in the form of poetry. He would be remembered as a writer, novelist, short story writer, poet and essayist. Cecily read an excerpt from *The Snake* and *The Piano* (the entire poem).

Greg Burns led the September meeting with poems based on song lyrics. The first two were by Paul Jarmin, an Australian composer, choirmaster and instrumentalist, whose compositions for choir and orchestra have been performed around the world in venues such as the White House and at the opening of the World Rugby and at the London Olympics. From 1996 Paul Jarman has been part of the Australian world music group, Sirocco. Greg Sea of Berries and Shackleton read (commissioned by Gondwana Voices as part of the song cycle 'Turn on the Open Sea'). Greg also mentioned a 13<sup>th</sup> century song, attributed to Martin Codax, which is the fifth of seven songs Cantigas de Amigo.

**Peter White** led the October meeting, reading some poems from C J Dennis's poems for children –

*If I were a baker; If I were a pieman; Tri-antiwonti-gongalope* and *Hist.* Fun poetry, enjoyed by everyone present.

#### VALE REBECCA MAXWELL

Rebecca Maxwell was а vital member of The Wordsmiths. Having been blind since early childhood. due to meningitis, she did not regard this as а disability. Rebecca said of



herself in an interview with *The Age*, 'I'm not special, it's just I'm made aware of something because I don't have "the other door". It's like, if the front door's locked you go in the back door, that's all. Some painters paint what's inside them and use the same faculty as I do. I'm disabled in that I can't see but as a general rule I don't feel disabled. I'm not grieving for something I haven't got, because if I tune in to all that's offered subliminally, the world is so rich.'

Feisty and straightforward, she made a contribution wherever she went, and was involved in a number of organisations, including her church and the local council. She was President of the Society of Women's writers Victoria from 2007-2009 and also worked tirelessly to champion the cause of Braille. She edited a book of life stories of people who use Braille: *Blind and Busy* and also released a collection of her poetry *With other senses*. In 2019, she was a finalist for the Blind Australian of the Year award. There were many laudatory comments at her funeral.

Through her poetry she challenged us to think again, and she always commented meaningfully on the work of others. We will sadly miss her at our gatherings. Using her walking-frame she travelled everywhere by taxi. When I spoke at the Lyceum Club some years ago, I was touched by the fact that she came along to support me.
