

Welcome to the August edition of Wordsmiths newsletter.

I love history in any form, and when it comes to poetry, I am always fascinated to read about Australia's 19th century female poets. Grace Elizabeth Jennings Carmichael (1867-1904) was one such poet, and even though she wrote some beautiful verse her life story is quite sad. Raised on a station near Orbost, she learned to love the Gippsland forest. She expressed verse in the sights, scents and sounds of the bush. At 20, she left home to become a lady's companion, and then a trainee nurse. Her book, Hospital Children, was published in 1891. In 1890 her poetry was published in Poems in Melbourne, and London in 1895. In the early 1890s she was a member of the Austral Salon and in September 1895 gave a lecture on The Spirit of the Bush with Alfred Deakin in the chair. In 1895 she married Henry Francis Mullins. They moved to South Australia and then to England, where she and her husband lived in poverty. After the death of one son and their only daughter, Grace died of pneumonia in Leyton workhouse in 1904. Three surviving sons lived in the Northampton workhouse until a group of Grace's admirers in Victoria launched an appeal to bring the children back to Australia in 1910, where they were reared in private homes, taking the



name Carmichael. In 1927, at Woodgrange Park Cemetery in London, a white marble book was placed on Grace's grave, inscribed with a few brief lines of hers on wattle blossom. Plaques were later unveiled to her memory at Orbost in 1937

and Ballarat in 1938. In the 1890s Grace was regarded as a 'graceful and genuine poetess' but later generations found her verse cloying rather than sweet and its philosophy homespun. *A Bush Gloaming* is perhaps her most well-known poem. I would love to sit down and have a chat with Grace Carmichael Jennings, even if just to say, You haven't been forgotten, nor has your poetry.

MEETINGS

Peter White led the May meeting with the music of Sons of Korah. Sons of Korah is an Australian based band founded in 1994 in Geelong. The name references the Old Testament family of that name and the band is devoted to giving a fresh voice to the biblical psalms. After playing three tracks of music, Peter then explained that the lyrics were from Psalms 1, 37 & 17.

Greg Burns led the June meeting with the poetry of UK poet Jenny Mitchell. Jenny won the Gregory O'Donoghue Prize 2022 and the Poetry Book Awards for her second collection, Map of a *Plantation*. The prize-winning debut collection *Her* Lost Language is one of 44 poetry books for 2019 (Poetry Wales) and her latest collection, Resurrection of a Black Man, contains three prizewinning poems and is featured on the US podcast Poetry Unbound. Jenny was Poet-in-residence at Sussex University in 2024, and has recently been appointed the British Library Poet in the Community, working with the Community Engagement Team. Greg read Map of a plantation; Wanting to know freedom; A gentlewoman; Her remains; Bending down to worship and Another vision of the goddess.

Cecily Falkingham led the July meeting and read from Leunig's *A common prayer* (published in 1991). Cecily read *Dear God, let us prepare for winter; We give thanks for domestic animals; There are only two feelings, Love and fear; and Dear God, We give thanks for birds.*


